Redemptive Rehabilitation

While this issue of the BM News is going to press, Hope Mission will be holding a sod-turning ceremony September 20th for its new multi-purpose facility at the corners of 106 Avenue and 99 and 100 Streets. The facility will be erected at the present site of the dilapidated and burned-out church pictured above.

Hope Mission, an Inner City Mission founded by Mr. & Mrs. Edwardson in 1929, has opened its doors daily for 53 years to meet the needs of over 700 people weekly.

Through the years the mission's ministry has been a co-operative effort

of many people, organizations and churches. A brochure outlining the purposes of Hope Mission at the new facility states that the Mission "increasingly senses the need for a more effective redemptive-rehabilitative ministry to the constituency it serves."

"To meet this need we must build a facility that becomes a temporary home where those who have indicated an interest in discovering how Jesus can change their lives, can stay and participate in counselling sessions, Bible studies and work programs that

will help them back into society and church fellowship on a lasting basis." explains the brochure.

The new facility will have three floors, each comprising approximately 5000 square feet. A total sum of \$800,000 is needed to complete the building, \$225,000 of which has already been raised.

The Provincial Government has further promised to match dollar for dollar any funds raised—to a maximum of \$400,000. Those who wish to support the building of this new facility can reach Hope Mission at 422-2018.

Something To Think About

According to Women and Poverty, a 1979 report by the National Council of Welfare, three out of every five poor adults in Canada are women. One and a quarter million Canadian women are living in poverty compared to two-thirds that number of Canadian men. The report states - "the poorest of all are elderly widows who worked hard all their lives with no pay or pension plan."

The report indicates most poor women who live alone are over the age of 55. A few are low-income women who never married or are divorced or separated, but, the majority are

widows who, upon their husband's death were left with inadequate funds to look after themselves.

In Canada, two out of every three elderly widows have incomes that are below the poverty line.

As Canadian women by tradition marry men who are slightly older than themselves and whose life expectancy is shorter than their own, most of them are likely to become widows at some point in their lives. In 1975, 45 per cent of widows aged 55 to 65 were poor, as were 66 per cent of those over the age of 65.

The report states "the foundation of the great financial vulnerability of women is the belief that most of them will always have a father or husband on whom they can count. In reality, one man in ten cannot support his family and almost three out of every four women find themselves alone sometime in their adult lives, victims in most cases of marriage breakdown or widowhood."

BOYLE ST. PARK FACILITY

The Boyle Street Community League is presently applying under the Major Cultural Recreation Facility Development Program to build a multi-purpose recreational facility.

In order to ensure that the building will meet the needs of the Boyle Street residents an ad hoc committee from the Boyle Street area has been formed to provide the Boyle Street Community League with information concerning the types of spaces and amenities required to operate a multifaceted program. This committee consists of representatives from the Boyle Street Community League, Bissell Centre, Boyle Street Co-op, Nechi Centre, Pioneer Place, Chinese Community Service Centre, and Edmonton Parks & Recreation.

The current plan is to have a tentative program schedule in place by October 15th, 1982. This schedule will include the needs as expressed by the above mentioned committee.

Prior to the commitment of public funds to this project, an operational committee comprised of the Boyle Street Community League, Boyle Street agencies and Edmonton Parks and Recreation will be formed. The purpose of this committee will be to insure that the building is programmed in a manner that is responsive to the needs of the Boyle Street residents.

It's a Matter of Health

PRENATAL CARE

When a woman discovers she is pregnant, there are many things to think about. One of the important ones is to let your doctor know and to start prenatal care soon.

Many years ago people realized that too many mothers and their babies did poorly when their babies were born or after the births. They studied the problem and learned that the mothers who saw their doctors early and regularly throughout pregnancy did much better than those who just arrived at the hospital to deliver their babies. The reason was that a great many problems could be discovered and corrected during pregnancy and therefore the baby and mother could be healthier. So they started prenatal care.

What does the doctor or nurse do when you go for prenatal care?

On the first visit they will usually ask you about your past history, any illnesses, operations or blood transfusions you may have had as well as about any pregnancies you have had in the past. It is also important to know about hereditary diseases that members of your family may have as well as whether there are any twins in your family. The questions about family history are about the families of both the mother and father of this new baby, because heredity is acquired from both parents.

The nurse or doctor will then do a general examination to detect problems or conditions you, the mother, may currently have. This will include an internal exam, part of which is to check the size of the womb or uterus.

Most likely they will arrange for you to return periodically - about every month in the first part, and more often as you get into the last couple of months of your pregnancy.

When you go for this first visit it is helpful if you can write out a list of the family history, your own history and the dates of delivery of any other children or of miscarriages and the length of your previous labours. It is also helpful if you can remember the date you started your last menstrual period.

On followup visits they will:

- 1) Check your urine to make sure your kidneys are handling the extra fluid load associated with pregnancy.
- 2) Check your weight to ensure you're not gaining too slowly or too quickly, because either one can be serious.
- 3) Check your blood pressure to make sure your circulation is good, and in late pregnancy to check if you are developing toxemia. (Toxemia is a serious condition that needs to be treated quickly!)
- 4) Check your tummy for the size and position of the baby, and in later pregnancy, listen for the baby's heart beat.
- 5) Check your legs and hands to make sure they are not swelling.
- 6) Check your blood occasionally to see if your iron level is good.

Northern Light Theatre

1982-1983 Season Set

Jace van der Veen's first season as the Artistic Director of Edmonton's Northern Light Theatre will be as purposefully eclectic as the man himself.

The Dutch-born director comes to Northern Light after fifteen years in Vancouver, where, as an Associate Director at the celebrated New Play Centre, he was at the hub of a Canadian playwrighting renaissance.

He makes his debut in Edmonton with a refreshing blend of plays old and new, from Canada and abroad.

"Northern Light should always produce plays that have something to say to this city," van der Veen allows. "But I feel you can draw from a wide range of sources and styles and periods to do that. To me, theatre is a place for mutual cultural recognition."

The company's ninth season opens October 29th with TRUE WEST, by the Pulitzer prize-winning American Playwright, Sam Shepard. This quick-on-the-trigger new comedy offers a hilarious variation on the old Western gunfight, as two feuding brothers — one a screenwriter, the other a petty thief — square-off in their mother's Southern California bungalow. Starring Edmonton Actors Robert Clinton and Wendell Smith, and directed by Jace van der Veen, TRUE WEST runs through November 13th at Theatre Network, 11845-77 Street.

In December, a popular family tradition returns to Northern Light.

THE SECOND SHEPHERDS' PLAY is a whimsical holiday pageant about three Bethlehem working stiffs who must watch their flocks by night in order to foil an enterprising rustler named Mak. At once raucous and profoundly reverent, this classic tale of the nativity will have a very special setting — McDougall United Church in the heart of downtown Edmonton (10025-101 Street). Associate Director Brian Deedrick leads a cast of actors, clowns, and musicians through a brief but merry run, December 22nd to 31st.

One of the ten new Albertan plays currently in development at Northern Light will come to full flower in March. This production will highlight the work of Northern Light's script development program — a program that has become as necessary to the company's operation as the purchase of lumber and paint. Among the playwrights recently receiving attention are Lyle Victor Albert, Conni Massing, Michael McKinlay, Addena Sumter, Brian Swarbrick, Murray J. McRae, and Glynis Whiting. Stay tuned, for a March 11th through 26th run at Theatre Network.

Closing the season in late Spring is the award-winning double-bill AFTER BABA'S FUNERAL AND SWEET AND SOUR PICKLES, by Vancouver playwright Ted Galay. Winners of the Canadian Authors Association award for drama, these remarkable one-acts trace the love and pride running through three generations of the Danischuk family, as, in the first play, a young mathematician returns home for his Grandmother's burial, and, in the second, a renegade widow and her disapproving sister-in-law come to blows on canning day. AFTER BABA'S FUNERAL and SWEET AND SOUR PICKLES will be presented both at lunch-hour and evening performances, May 20th through June 4th, in the Centennial Library Theatre (7 Sir Winston Churchill Square).

Transportation Update

Boyle Street and McCauley continue to be threatened by plans to increase substantially the traffic flow through these neighbourhoods. These plans are in direct opposition to the Boyle St./McCauley Area Redevelopment Plan which was passed by City Council last summer. At that time, the roadway plans were delayed due to intense neighbourhood opposition, pending the completion of a city-wide transportation plan.

It appears that in the next few weeks a city transportation plan (TRANSPLAN) will be made public. Preliminary indications are that TRANSPLAN will have a serious negative impact on the residents of Boyle St. and McCauley.

Twin one-way roadways with increased traffic are being planned: (106-107A Avenue - East and West; 95-96 St. and 97-98 St. - North and South). The city has already applied to the Provincial Government for matching funding for the 106-107A Avenue twin, which means that it is likely to be a truck route. TRANSPLAN may contain additional threats to inner city neighbourhoods.

Watch for the details of TRANSPLAN at the end of September, and plan to take part in the upcoming community events around the transportation issue. For further information, call Larry Brockman. (429-5045)

Health Centre Sets Goals

A health-centered Health Centre linked closer to the residents of Boyle Street and McCauley is the goal set for the Boyle McCauley Health Centre in a weekend retreat-workshop involving the board, staff and volunteers. This goal will be followed up in the form of three major projects.

A project immediately underway is the hiring of a nurse practitioner to develop a parent/child program to promote health in young children.

Several residents will be trained as neighbourhood health workers (persons given training to work with health professionals to bring health care and health education closer to the community), thereby changing the focus of health care delivery.

The addition, a second doctor, to allow more time for follow up in hospital and home visits, will facilitate the health centre objective to be closer to the community.

A new approach to fund raising is to be carried out to stabilize the financial base of the Health Centre. A program of public education through the media as well as year round public relations strategies will be used to make the Health Centre more familiar to the public.

Board reports indicated that negotiations with Alberta Health care are continuing and that an interim agreement is in place pending the outcome of negotiations.

A Day at Bissel Centre

8.30. Men and women are on the steps when staff arrive. They sit quietly in the waiting room until Jeannie, the receptionist has coffee ready. Thirty-six people are in this morning for coffee and goodies.

9.00 Mothers and children arrive at the child care. Two volunteers, Elinor and Lucille, arrive to work on the mailing list.

10.00 Doug, a social worker, deals with a client new to Edmonton who is seeking work. Later, he is off to the meeting of The Urban House Co-ordinating Committee. Three volunteers, Marg, Mary and Nancy from the Community Involvement division of Bissell Board join him at the meeting to set policy.

11.00 A Federal Government staff person arrives to have a contract signed. Bissell has been granted funding for five summer staff to work with the youth.

11.15 "Big" Larry is called to help carry in some donations.

11.30 At the store at 10922-97 St., Mildred is negotiating the arrival of a shipment of items from a rural church. Because of lack of space, we must limit each shipment to 10 boxes. Someone has been sent to the store seeking household items. We never have enough of these articles.

12.30 Two customers are helping each other select clothing, one choosing items to send to a family in Poland.

day had started at 5.00a.m. with a call regarding a suicide. He is feeling overwhelmed by the increase in crises, brought on by population increase and economic pressures.

3.00 June, in Child Care, is upset. She has had to refuse a family because child care is full. Tomorrow there will be an outing to Borden Park for children and their families.

3.30 A volunteer arrives for an interview. Someone needs a pair of shoes. Vegetables and baking are dispatched from the Food Bank. The phone rings constantly—calls about renting the camp, calls from Central Volunteer Bureau. Interviews are arranged. One group wants to borrow the slide presentation on Bissell, and a school group wants a speaker. Letters to a service agency wanting to support the camp are being written.

4.00 A "Messenger" group (Children 6 - 8 years old), from one of the churches, arrives for a tour of Bissell. The members of the executive arrive for their monthly meeting to prepare for a Board meeting. Ron, a youth worker gets a call from an inmate in the Remand Centre, asking that a message be passed to his brother who will be in for tonight's Drop-in.

4.30 The working day for some staff draws to a close. Various members head for home while others catch a quick supper to return for meetings or to make presentations that evening. Al, driver for the store, has done 11 pickups today.

6.00 Four young people from Peterborough are on the door step. They have had nothing to eat since they left Winnipeg. They are given coffee and the staff hustle about finding bread and sandwich filling. The young people are sent to the youth hostel for the night and invited to return in the morning for warmer clothing and job assistance.

7.00 Wes, and a volunteer, host 30 at the Teen Drop-in.

Tomorrow will be another need-filled day and we'll be here to do the best we can.

2.00 Doug arrives in the office of Margery Stelck, Bissell director. His
